New Position to Work Closely with CRRA Cities and Towns

HARTFORD, Conn. – Christian Stumpf has been named operations manager-customer care by the Connecticut Resources Recovery Authority. In this newly created position, he will work with CRRA's municipal and commercial customers to solve contract issues and develop creative solutions for their solid waste disposal and recycling needs.

Prior to joining CRRA, Stumpf was consulting with the Yankee Atomic Power companies in the areas of litigation and project management. Stumpf has 15 years experience in waste management, including five as the American Ref-fuel plant manager overseeing the CRRA Southeast Project waste-to-energy plant located in Preston. There he worked closely with the communities and the authority to improve operations and lower tip fees.

Stumpf has a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He also completed the U.S. Naval Nuclear Power Program earning the designation of Nuclear Plant Engineer. He is a member of the American Society of Safety Engineers, a Certified Safety Professional, and a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, for which he chaired the subcommittee on testing for the Qualification of Resource Recovery Operators Committee.

Stumpf lives in Old Lyme with his wife, Tracy, and their children, Peter and Madeline.
