

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# Statewide Situation Where the trash went in FY 2008







# Southwest Division/SWEROC Division Update

- Surpluses from former Bridgeport Project distributed to member towns in 2009
  - Additional distributions will depend on the sale of the Waterbury landfill and remaining lawsuits
- FY 2011 disposal fee: \$64.16/ton (1.8% increase)
   Includes CRRA administrative fee of \$2.05/ton



# Southwest Division/SWEROC Division Update

- Stratford recycling center requires retrofit for single-stream capability
  - Financing requires minimum 40,000 TPY
  - Cost: \$7.5 million
  - Towns would get \$0/ton tip fee and rebates
  - Need towns' commitments by June 2010
  - Alternatives include truck transfer from Stratford to CRRA Hartford facility or private facility



# Southwest Division/SWEROC Division Update


- Garbage Museum no longer funded by SWEROC nor subsidized by trash fees
  - Museum operating with donations and admission fees
  - Seeking other sources to keep Museum open
    - Contributions ruled tax-deductible by IRS

### Southeast Project MSW Tonnages



### Wallingford Project Future

- Covanta owns trash-to-energy plant as of July 1, 2010
  - 5 Project towns contract directly with Covanta effective July I
    - \$65/ton plus COLA for 10 years
  - CRRA retains access to full plant capacity through right of first refusal
    - Lowest price must be offered first to CRRA
    - Capacity becomes system asset
    - Additional 25,000 tons capacity reserved for CRRA at \$55/ton


### Service Issues

- Service Issues:
  - Bulky accepted at WPF now that Hartford landfill has closed
  - Mattresses:
    - Presently accepting as part of bulky waste loads
    - New fiscal year will have new mattress pricing and may encourage segregated delivery
    - CRRA intends to continue to provide at-cost disposal for mattresses from Project towns
    - Present bulky waste tip fee does not cover the expense of mattress disposal




### Mid-Connecticut Project MSW Tonnages

# Mid-Connecticut Project FY 2011 Tip Fee Guidance

- FY 2010 tip fee: \$69/ton
  - \$63 with credit from distribution of excess reserves
    - 18 towns opted to defer \$6/ton credit to FY 2011
- Note:
  - New pricing includes 14% reductions in headcount and other cost reductions
    - Administration (overhead) costs ~3%



# Mid-Connecticut Project FY 2011 Tip Fee Guidance

- FY 2011 tip fee
  - Proposed budget to Finance Committee Feb. 18
    - Full board Feb. 25 will set tipping fee at net cost
  - Must complete closure of Hartford landfill
    - Legislature committed \$13m in bond money
      - \$3m delivered to date
      - \$10 million awaiting action by State Bond Commission



- State needs publicly owned landfill to replace Hartford landfill
- State has USA's most rigorous design and siting requirements



- Franklin site chosen after three-year search of entire state
  - DEP had previously identified Franklin site
  - Few, if any, viable sites remain
- Would save taxpayers \$200 million over 30year life (saving towns \$7 to \$9/ton of trash)
- Statute required host fee of ~\$3 million/year



 March 2008: CRRA begins outreach and education process in Franklin and surrounding towns

- Public meetings, mailings, news stories, Web site

May 2008: Substitute SB 357 passes Senate 33-0
 – "Talked to death" in House in final hour of session



• April 2009: Franklin voters approve non-binding referendum

- 401-97

- June 2009: Legislature passes SB 3
   95-51 in House, 27-4 in Senate
- June 2009: Governor vetoes SB 3, deferring to scientific evaluation process

- Aug. 24: Testing confirms Franklin meets the state's rigorous criteria and is the best site
- Aug. 26:
  - AG joins opponents and speaks at Capitol rally
    - Promises legal action to block landfill
  - Governor, who had vetoed SB 3, sends letter of opposition to be read at rally



#### Mid-Connecticut Project Franklin Ash Landfill Initiative

- Aug. 27: CRRA regular board meeting
  - Decision: whether to proceed?
  - \$300K would be needed Sept. I to continue permitting process
    - Legislature opposed
    - Governor now opposed
    - Attorney General promising legal battle
    - Board votes to suspend development, investigate additional alternatives
    - Site remains viable, may be considered if alternatives are not viable or reasonable



## Mid-Connecticut Project

#### Trash-to-Energy Plant Capital Projects

- \$14m in last five years
  - Projects to improve efficiency and lower costs of operation and maintenance
    - Improvements to odor-control system
    - Replacement of control process interface
    - Re-engineering of conveyor systems
    - Repair and replacement of rear-stage turbine diaphragms to optimize heat rate
    - Replacement of Inconel-overlay pressure parts and installation of nickel-based proprietary overlay in lower waterwalls
    - Repower of shredder drives to 1250 HP



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#### Issues Resolved in 2009

- Franklin Ash Landfill Initiative
- New Hartford v. CRRA
- Recycling
  - Bottle bill expansion
  - Single-stream expansion



#### Issues Resolved in 2009 New Hartford v. CRRA

- May: Connecticut Supreme Court upholds \$35.8m judgment
  - Money distributed to towns in 2008
    - Towns' lawyers collect \$8.9m from towns
  - Impact to tipping fee: \$11.68/ton higher for each of 4 years
- June 2009: Towns' lawyers drop challenge to FY 2009 budget



#### Issues Resolved in 2009 Recycling

- Bottle bill expansion
  - Water bottles now covered by deposits
  - When prices rebound, projects expect to lose \$1m with diversion of plastic to deposit system
- Single-stream introduction
  - Available in all or parts of 64 towns served by CRRA Mid-Connecticut Project
  - Mid-Conn recycling rate has increased each year since introduction
  - Stratford facility can be retrofitted to single-stream within 12 months of decision



#### Issues Resolved in 2009 Recycling

- Mid-Connecticut Project pays per-ton recycling bonuses to each participating town
- REMEMBER: EVERY TON
   RECYCLED IS A TON YOU DON'T
   PAY TIPPING FEE TO DISPOSE !!!!

### Issues to Watch in 2010 Ash Disposal

- Alternatives to publicly-owned ash landfill are being developed and evaluated
  - Recycling/re-use
  - Out-of-state ash disposal
  - Reconsideration of Franklin site
- Alternatives will cost substantially more than anticipated Franklin ash landfill cost



## Issues to Watch in 2010 Legislation

- Governance
  - CRCOG is sponsoring a new solid waste authority
  - CCSWA's leaders have requested Legislature to transfer Mid-Connecticut Project facilities to its new waste authority
  - AFSCME has asked Legislature to study disbanding CRRA



### Issues to Watch in 2010 Legislation

• Fees

 Potential increase in Solid Waste Assessment ("dioxin tax" now \$1.50/ton), other fees that would increase disposal costs to towns



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## Issues to Watch in 2010 SWEROC

- Towns in or out?
  - Opportunities for non-participating towns at Stratford facility
- Retrofit of recycling processing center?
   Would expand single-stream recycling
- Garbage Museum must be self-sustaining
  - Still needs major funding sources



#### Issues to Watch in 2010 MDC

- CRRA has paid bills in full on time
- MDC now claims CRRA owes millions in costs MDC might incur after contract expires
  - Issue is under arbitration
  - Project towns should not be responsible for costs if CRRA does not prevail



Issues to Watch in 2010 Mid-Connecticut Project Future

- Mid-Connecticut Project Special Committee
  - To insure CRRA plans effectively for post-project options
  - Committee membership:
    - Representatives of Hartford, East Hartford, Windsor Locks, Canton and Barkhamsted
    - Five representatives of CRRA
  - Next meeting: March 24, 2010
    - Information on CRRA Web site

Issues to Watch in 2010 Mid-Connecticut Project Future

- RFQ for operation and maintenance of facilities issued 2009
- CRRA preparing RFP for operator contracts

   WPF contract (MDC) expires November 2011
   PBF (Covanta) contract expires May 2012



Issues to Watch in 2010 Mid-Connecticut Project Future

- CRRA developing new MSA
  - Initial term 5 years
    - <u>No</u> full-faith-and-credit
    - <u>No</u> put-or-pay or minimum commitment
    - Free recycling
    - Net cost of operation
  - Towns can also choose lower-tier contracts or spot contracts (will require tonnage commitments)
  - Draft MSAs will be circulated for comment this spring (return comments by April 30)



- Bridgeport Project
  - Combe Fill South Landfill
    - Claim against CRRA, towns settled in 2009
    - Other claims still could be made
  - Hennessey v. CRRA and City of Milford
    - Worker injured at Milford transfer station in 2007
    - CRRA defense paid by insurance



- Bridgeport Project
  - RTC v. CRRA
    - RTC former operator of Shelton landfill gas system
      - RTC in bankruptcy, has no \$ to pay CRRA's counterclaim
      - Could be dispute over ownership of gas collection system
  - Vidal v. CRRA
    - Contractor employee injured at Norwalk transfer station in 2007
    - CRRA defense paid by Wheelabrator's insurance



- Mid-Connecticut Project
  - Estate of ONE/CHANE v. CRRA
    - Bankruptcy trustee sued CRRA for \$20m in 2008
      - Alleged breach of contract
      - Under 1999 agreement, CRRA would have paid ONE/CHANE \$10m if CRRA pursued expansion of the Hartford landfill
        - » CRRA dropped expansion initiative
    - Trial scheduled for June



- Mid-Connecticut Project
  - AIG v. CRRA
    - AIG paid settlement to Hartford property owners in Incredible Motels action against CRRA
    - AIG has sued demanding reimbursement
    - CRRA has filed counterclaim alleging bad faith
    - Trial scheduled for summer



- Mid-Connecticut Project
  - Enron Global
    - Remaining defendants have had motions to dismiss CRRA's action pending since fall 2008
